William Marshall, 1st Earl of Pembroke  He obtained the title thru his married to Isabel/Eva de Clare, daughter of Earl Richard Strongbow (Richard de Clare, Earl of Pembroke and Striguil/Chepstow). William made possible the realization of the Magna Carta. Was a Templar right before his death. His five sons were all successively Earls of Pembroke and Marshall of England, but all died without issue. The title was passed on through his daughters.	1146	1219	53/71	73




