Start with these plays

Play	Selling points
A Midsummer Night's Dream	Well-known and fun, with darker depths to explore while reading.
Romeo and Juliet	Familiar, only one plot to keep track of.
The Merry Wives of Windsor	Lighthearted and fun; there is a subplot but it's tightly woven into the main plot.
Measure for Measure	Very dark and lots to talk about.
Julius Caesar	The language is quite clear, and there are great political discussions to be had.
after Julius Caesar, try Antony and Cleopatra	Sort of a sequel to <i>Julius Caesar</i> ; a rich play with many layers.
Macbeth	Also quite familiar to most of us.
Henry the Fifth	The classic tale, but watch for the undertones of war criminals.
Richard the Third	Pretty clear plot, fairly easy to follow.
Coriolanus	You might not know this play as well as others, but it is pretty easy to follow. Its fictional story takes place before <i>Julius Caesar</i> .
The Merchant of Venice	A rich play, and one that is probably rather familiar.

These plays have less convoluted plots than some others, plus you may already be familiar with them.
